

# Arrests Over The Past Week

## Six Total Violations

They were linked to a string of burglaries which occurred in Clark, Estill, Powell and Montgomery Counties.

Since his arrest in Powell County, Dunaway was indicted for three first degree burglaries in Estill County. Those burglaries occurred on April 11, April 17, and June 2, 2013.

Guns were reported taken at all three burglaries, which resulted in the first degree charges.

The Estill County Grand Jury also charged Dunaway with being a persistent felony offender in the first degree.

Dunaway's bond on this latest charge was set at \$20,000 cash.

He is scheduled to be arraigned in Estill District Court on January 22.

## Public Intoxication

Robert L. Isaacs, 68, of Dawes Road, Irvine, was charged with public intoxication by the Irvine Police Department's Officer John Sturniolo on January 14. The officer said he was dispatched to 206 Mount Crest to check the welfare of a male subject passed out in his vehicle. He added the man had one leg in the vehicle and one leg out, and the driver side door was open.

The officer said upon his arrival, he found Isaacs slumped over the steering wheel. He added that Isaacs did not respond to his verbal commands. After shaking Isaacs, The officer said that he had slurred speech and failed field sobriety tests.

The officer added that Isaacs had a prescription filled earlier that day for 30 units of 1 mg clonazepam, but only 24 units remained in the bottle.

Robert Mullens, 29, of Mt. Crest, Irvine, was charged with disorderly conduct and criminal mischief second degree on January 14 by Officer Sturniolo.

The officer said Mullens caused public alarm when he damaged a vehicle parked in front of 154 Madison Avenue, Irvine.

Sturniolo said Mullens had gone to 154 Madison Avenue where his girlfriend was visiting.

The officer stated that Mullens began yelling and cursing his girlfriend in the street area.

He added the man then began punched and damaged the vehicle owned by his girlfriend's mother.

## Driving Under The Influence

Brandon Stamper, 32, of Zoe, KY was charged January 4 by Officer Karl Rifembark with operating a motor vehicle under the influence.

David Haney, 31, of Turner Avenue, Irvine, was charged with violation of city ordinance 92.01 - duty of maintenance of private properties. Officer John Sturniolo wrote that a pickup truck was unlicensed and not insured. There was debris on front of residence, sides and rear, along with upholstered furniture on the front porch.

Karl Baker, 22, of South Madison was arrested January 8 by Office Sturniolo on two warrants. One states that Baker failed to pay \$188.00 for fourth degree assault during domestic violence and the other warrant states that Baker failed to show proof of domestic violence counseling. The first warrant states that Baker can serve four days and pay a \$30.00 service fee.

Jack Kindred, 58, of Stanton was arrested January 11 for fourth degree assault (domestic violence) by Officer Karl Rifembark. The citation states that Kindred pushed his live-in girlfriend and then told her he was going to kill her. The incident occurred at Renaissance Apartments, Irvine.

Crystal M. Hatton, 31, of Winchester Road, Irvine, was picked up on a bench warrant January 10 by Chief Brad Smith. The bench warrant said that Hatton had tested positive for drugs and failed to complete treatment. She has been found guilty of criminal possession of a forged instrument, second; receiving stolen property under \$10,000; and complicity to possession of a forged instrument, second.

Daniel Lee McCandless, 44, of Stanton, was charged on January 11 with possession of drug paraphernalia by Officer Jeff Knuckles.

The citation states that Knuckles was dispatched to Marcum & Wallace Hospital in connection with several people who were seeking treatment connected to a stabbing that occurred in Powell County. Officer Knuckles said he observed McCandless get something out of his shoe, and he located an uncapped syringe on the hospital bed McCandless was lying on.

## Six Total Violations

A homeless man was arrested Wednesday, January 8 on a warrant obtained by Constable Danny Conrad.

Autumn F. Reed, 37, was charged in a traffic matter which includes four violations and two felonies.

The arrest warrant states that on December 13, 2013, Reed failed to stop for the constable. Conrad said he had attempted to pull Reed over for a suspicion of driving under the influence and a broken tail light.

Conrad said that Reed continued to drive down River Drive to Court Street where his vehicle ran upon the sidewalk and continued to accelerate to a dangerous speed.

He added that Reed then ran the stop sign at Court Street and Broadway and another stop sign at Laurel and Rice Street intersection.

Reed's vehicle slid into the yard of a residence, before almost colliding with oncoming traffic, Conrad stated.

The constable said that Reed then went up Rice Street to Sweet Lick Road, while driving erratically.

Conrad said that Reed continued up Chestnut Stand where he created a barricade and escaped into the wilderness.

Reed was charged with fleeing or evading police, first degree (motor vehicle) and wanton endangerment, first degree. Both charges are felonies.

He was also charged with no tail lamps, failure to give an improper signal, three counts of disregarding stop signs, and reckless driving.

Bail for Reed was set at \$10,000 cash. Court records say he was arrested on a new offense while he had a case pending.

Applications due by Friday, January 17, 2014

### Conservation Stewardship Program

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) is opening the Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP) for new enrollments for federal fiscal year 2014. Now through January 17, 2014, producers interested in participating in the program can submit applications to NRCS.

The application process for NRCS's conservation programs is continuous, but funding selections for specific programs are made throughout the year. For the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) and Wildlife Habitat Incentive Program (WHIP) the first application cutoff period date for consideration for 2014 funds is January 17, 2014. Applications received after January 17, 2014, will be held until the next application cut off period, which will be April 18, 2014.

### Apple Rootstock, Strawberries & More

The Estill County Cooperative Extension Service will be ordering apple and pear rootstocks this month only. If you want to propagate a favorite apple or pear, grafting is one of the easiest ways to preserve that cultivar. To graft, you will need scion wood (terminal branch segments from last year's growth collected at the end of February) and rootstock. If you do not know how to graft, come by the office for assistance.

We typically order Malling7 (55% of standard size) and/or MM.111 (80% of standard) semi-dwarf apple rootstock and a pear rootstock. Please pre-pay your order by January 24th. The rootstocks usually arrive by the first week of March.

As an additional service to our community, we are taking orders for reasonably priced and good quality strawberry, blackberry, blueberry, raspberry, asparagus, and Candy onion plants through March 21st. Orders must be prepaid with delivery expected early April. If you are interested or need more information, call 606-723-4557.

### USDA Farm Storage Loans Available

Kentucky USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) State Executive Director John W. McCauley reminds farmers and ranchers that Farm Storage Facility Loans (FSFL) are available through FSA.

The Farm Service Agency offers low-interest loans to grain producers to build new or upgrade existing storage facilities and permanent drying and handling equipment.

#### Loan opportunities include, but are not limited to:

- \* New conventional-type cribs or bins, oxygen-limiting and other upright silo-type structures, and flat-type storage structures designed for whole grain storage,
- \* Perforated floors, safety equipment, quality improvement equipment, electrical equipment and concrete components considered essential for a fully functional storage facility,
- \* Remodeling existing storage facilities to increase storage capacity.

Farm storage facility loans must be approved prior to site preparation, equipment purchase or construction, and must be secured by a promissory note and security agreement. The new maximum principal loan amount is \$500,000. Participants are required to provide a down payment of 15 percent, with CCC providing a loan for the remaining 85 percent of the net cost of the eligible storage facility and permanent drying and handling equipment.

Additional security is required for poured-cement open-bunker silos, renewable biomass facilities, cold storage facilities, hay barns and for all loans exceeding \$50,000. New loan terms of seven, 10 or 12 years are available depending on the amount of the loan. Interest rates for each term rate may be different and are based on the rate which CCC borrows from the Treasury Department.
