Ricky Williams was sworn in for his first term as constable of District 1. It is a four-year term.



Floyd Edmonson was sworn in Friday by Circuit Judge Tom Jones. Edmonson stated he is beginning his sixth four-year term as constable. He represents District 3. JP Barnes, constable of District 2, was sworn in privately. He is in his second term as constable. Constables serve without pay except for small fees received.

Rogers elected 1st county surveyor

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He also had to certify with the county clerk's office that he was qualified as a surveyor.

Rogers graduated from Eastern Kentucky University with a degree in physics and a minor in math. He obtained his master's degree from the University of Kentucky in civil engineering.

Rogers is employed by Abacus Engineering of Richmond where he also does surveys. He received his surveyor's license in 2011.

Rogers was welcomed as the county surveyor by Judge/Executive Wallace Taylor.

Taylor said that Rogers would be valuable when a road was going to be closed.

When property disputes come up, Rogers can be appointed to do surveys.

Rogers will not receive a set salary as county surveyor. The law allows Rogers to charge reasonable fees for his survey work. If a survey is done because of a land dispute, Rogers said the parties involved in the dispute would pay his fees.

Constables from districts 1 and 3 were also sworn in Friday. They were Ricky Williams and Floyd Edmonson.

The constable also does not receive a set salary for their work. The constitution includes a fee schedule for constables for their duties, which includes killing and burying a distempered horse for which he or she would receive payment of \$3.00 per animal.

A constable can receive \$10.00 from the state treasurer for apprehending a person wanted on a felony charge.

A constable can be paid mileage and expenses for transporting a prisoner to a penitentiary or to another jail.

The four year term of county officials began Monday, January 5. The law says their term begins on the first Monday after New Year's Day.



Gerry Flannery took the oath of office as magistrate of District 2, Flannery attended his first fiscal court meeting as magistrate on Monday. The meeting was recessed for an hour but the fiscal court rehired deputies and heads of departments. Bonds were also approved for elected officials.

Hospital Administrator Nationally Recognized

Individuals included on the list lead some of the largest and most prominent hospitals and health systems in the nation. Becker's Hospital Review has published a version of this list annually since 2010, and this is the second time the list has included 130 leaders. (Leaders did not and cannot pay to be included on the list.)

The Becker's Hospital Review editorial team selected leaders through an editorial review process that considered a wide range of demonstrated management and leadership skills, like oversight of hospital or health system operations, financial turnarounds and quality improvement initiatives.

Starling's recognition highlighted career accomplishments including being named President and CEO of MWMH in 2001 and being named the recipient of the 2013 American Hospital Association Shirley Ann Munroe Leadership Award recognizing her as a leader in rural healthcare.

(Irvine, KY) - Kentucky River Foothills Development Council, Inc. will begin the crisis component of the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) that assists households in a heating crisis on Monday, January 12. The program will run through March 31 or until the funds are expended.

Only those with disconnect or eviction notices or who are within 48 hours of being without heat can receive assistance during the crisis component. Both homeowners and renters who qualify are eligible.

Applications will be taken Monday through Friday from 8 am-4 pm at the Estill County Outreach Office located at 111 Collins Street, Irvine, 723-4492.

A household shall be

considered to have a home heating crisis situation when it meets the basic LIHEAP eligibility criteria and: (1) the household is within four (4) days of running out of fuel if bulk fuel (coal, fuel oil, propane, kerosene, or wood) is the heat source; (2) the household has received a past due/disconnect notice if natural gas or electric is the heat source; or (3) the household's home heating costs are included as an undesignated portion of the rent, and the household has received an eviction notice for non-payment of rent from the landlord.

All assistance provided with LIHEAP funds must be directly related to resolving the household's home heating crisis situation. A household may not receive more than the household's

allowable crisis maximum in combined benefits, through the Crisis component. The allowable crisis maximum is determined by the household's primary fuel type.

To apply, participants must bring their disconnect/past due notice from a metered utility company, eviction notice if heating expenses are included in rent; metered utility bill (natural gas, electric, or water) as proof of address; Social Security cards, or Permanent Residence card

(Green Card) for each member of household; Driver's License or State-Issued ID Card for person applying for benefits, and proof of all household income from preceding month.

LIHEAP is a statewide initiative sponsored by Community Action Kentucky Inc. in partnership with the Cabinet for Health and Family Services (CHFS) and is directly funded by the U.S. Department for Health and Human Services, Administration for Children and Families.

William C. Shade, 37, of Noland Hill Road, Irvine was arrested on a bench warrant on January 4 by Irvine Officer Sam Hensley. The bench warrant was issued by District Judge Bo Leach because Shade had failed to pay a \$913 fine and \$30 service fee. Shade was found guilty in Estill District Court on August 15, 2012 of failure to wear seat belts, no registration plates, and failure to owner to maintain required insurance. No registration receipt was merged. Shade could post a bond of \$943.00 cash.

Jonathan Dixon, 23, of Noland Court, Irvine was arrested December 27 by Officer John Sturniolo at his residence. Dixon was charged with alcohol intoxication. The officer stated that Dixon was outside his home and unsteady on his feet and had slurred speech. He told the officer that he drank a 1/2 pint of whiskey and taken xanax. Dixon was taken to Marcum & Wallace Hospital for medical clearance.

A Powell County bench warrant was served December 29 on Elizabeth Banks, 24, of Noland Court Irvine by Sgt. Mike Gross. The warrant was issued by Powell Circuit Judge F. Fletcher. It states that Banks was indicted for 10,000.

On January 2, Stacy Lewis, 24, of Richmond was arrested by IPD Officer John Sturniolo. The warrant was issued because Madison County authorities state that Lewis is in violation of an order to pay child support.

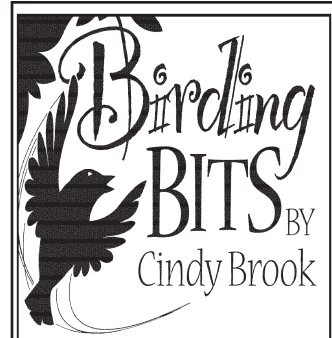
