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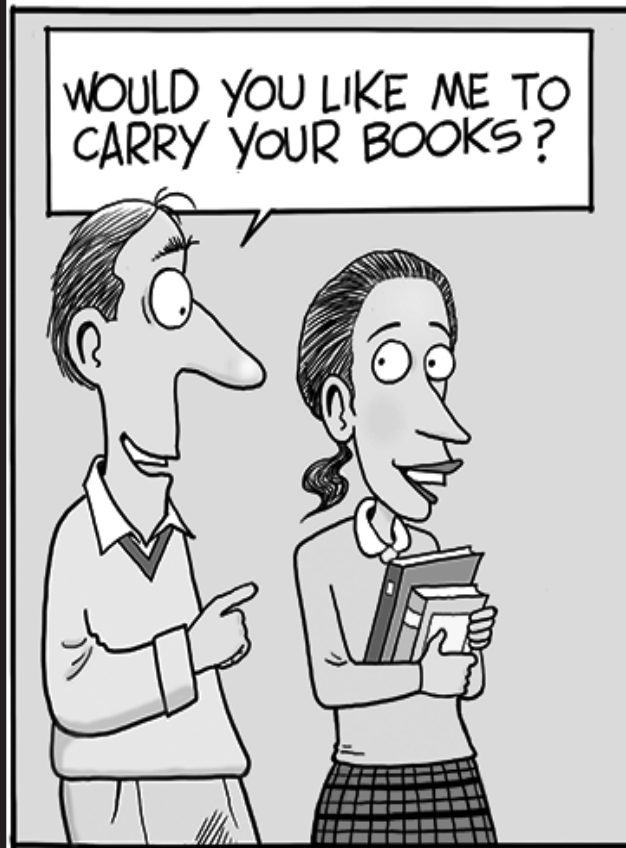

Opposed To Deep Well Fracking

I second the concerns expressed by Paula White about what deep well fracking could do to the community. The over 300 who attended the meeting earlier in February in Berea and the large gathering at the Estill County fair barn show that concerns are quite widespread, and rightly so. The two talks by Xyara Asplen (Frack Free Foothills) and Jim Scheff (Kentucky Heartwood) gave an informative list of problems related to current hydraulic fracturing of Kentucky shale formations: chemicals in water used as well as quantity and impoundments, noise and road congestion, air pollution problems, land disturbances that threaten the tourist industry, and several safety and health issues. The possibility of earthquakes so near the Blue Grass Army

Depot was also mentioned and worth our special consideration.

However, an unspoken longer-term problem area involves highjacking our emerging renewable energy economy most needed to halt greenhouse gas buildup. Ironically, cheaper and supposedly cleaner fracked natural gas does not mean climate change is being retarded; in fact, when all the analyses are completed, fracking may prove to be hastening the possible catastrophe that could hit this planet by the end of this century. Welcoming the use of this fracking practice could be a devil in disguise and a discerning public ought to pause before signing gas and oil leases. This is truly a moral issue.

March is severe weather preparedness month

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March has been designated as Severe Weather Preparedness Month in Estill County and other counties across the state and have designated this month as a time for severe weather preparedness.

The Estill County EMA urges you and your family to review these safety tips as we enter the peak severe weather season in Kentucky.

Flash Flooding Safety Rules: Flash floods and floods are the #1 storm related killer in Kentucky and across the United States.

If driving, **DO NOT DRIVE THROUGH FLOODED AREAS!** Even if it looks shallow enough to cross. The majority of deaths due to flooding are due to people driving through flooded areas. Water only one foot deep and displace 1500 pounds! Two feet of

water can easily carry most vehicles. Roadways concealed by floodwaters may not be intact.

If caught outside, go to higher ground immediately! Avoid small rivers or streams, low spots, culverts, or ravines. Do not try to walk through flowing water more than ankle deep, as it only takes six inches of water to knock you off your feet. Do not allow children to play around streams, drainage ditches, or viaducts, storm drains, or other flooded areas.

If ordered to evacuate or if rising water is threatening, leave immediately and get to higher ground.

Lightning Safety Rules

Lightning is the number two storm related killer. In Kentucky, more people are killed by lightning in an average year than tornadoes. Although severe thunderstorm warnings are NOT issued for lightning, you should move to shelter when thunder is heard as lightning can strike 10 to 15 miles away from where the rain is falling.

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
