Winchester man is charged with armed robbery

A Winchester man was arrested October 19 by Kentucky State Police in connection with a deadly robbery on Richmond Road on Oct. 6.

The man arrested on a warrant was Colby Cross, 25, of Ecton Road. Cross was charged with first degree robbery.

The robbery has been investigated by Detective Austin Brashear of Post 7, KSP in Richmond.

The warrant says that Cross, along with two other individuals, entered a residence on Richmond Road. The three were armed with deadly weapons in an attempt to take money from the resident.

80 year old man arrested again for trafficking

An 80 year old resident of Cressy Road has been arrested again by Kentucky State Police for trafficking in drugs, the second time in less than two months.

Sheriff Chris Flynn, Deputy Brad Smith, and KSP Trooper Ty Robinson went to the residence of Bobby Osborne on October 21 to investigate a

trailer stolen out of Clark County.

Sheriff Flynn and the Clark County Sheriff's Office had been working together on the case. Flynn had received a tip that the stolen trailer was at Osborne's residence.

When the officers went to Osborne's home, they said they saw four trailers.

Trooper Robinson said as they pulled in, Osborne and an unnamed female were walking toward his front porch.

While the trooper was talking to Osborne, he said that Osborne continuously put his hands in his pocket. He also noticed a large bulge in both front jeans pockets. For safety reasons, he asked Osborne what was in his pockets. Osborne pulled out two wads of cash.

Trooper Robinson said there was still a bulge in Osborne's pocket, and he asked what that was. Osborne put his hand back in his pocket and brought it out. He said, "nothing."

Library board votes to open new library in safe phase

The library board met on Wednesday, September 21st to discuss several items on the agenda including the opening of the new library located on Broadway.

The library has been closed to the public since March due to the pandemic. The time that it has been closed allowed employees to transition material from the old library on Main Street to the new building.

Currently the library is in phase 2 of reopening which includes home delivery, curbside services, virtual programs, and also allowing one person

at a time in the foyer to use the laptop.

Wi-Fi is also available for people to use from the parking lot.

Jamie Carroll, president of the library board, said she thought they should move into phase 3 considering schools have reopened and the county is now back in the orange.

"People aren't curious anymore. They are getting agitated," stated board member Myra Finney.

She said that phase 3 would allow 10 people to be in the library at a time and that patrons would need to make an appointment to enter the library. Their time would be limited to 20 minutes per visit.

Vice-president Ann Miller asked where the 10 people at a time was coming from because to her understanding Madison County had reopened their library and were back to business as usual.

Watson replied that the number had been put out due to the amount of square footage in the building and the gover-

nor's guidelines.

Carroll stated that she thought it was unfriendly to the patrons of the library to ask them to make an appointment

Watson said that they would allow walk-ins, however, there would still only be ten people at a time allowed in the building so some might have to wait. She added that there would be no public restrooms or water fountains available at this time.

The library will continue with curbside services and home deliveries for anyone who does not feel comfortable entering the building.
