


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Drunk Again

Baptist Health Gets \$1 Million Grant

A \$1 million grant to combat opioid and substance abuse in two southcentral Kentucky counties will support Baptist Health's latest effort to expand and deepen its behavioral health services across the Commonwealth and Southern Indiana.

Baptist Health Corbin secured the grant to serve 1,000 families a year for the next three years in its home county of Whitley and neighboring Knox County. The grant, which launched Sept. 1, 2020, funds a collaborative effort that includes long-time behavioral health partner Cumberland River Behavioral Health. Primary beneficiaries of the federal Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) grant will be pregnant women, those seeking Emergency Department treatment for substance abuse-related conditions and youth.
