Library Corner by Susie Thomas Clerk & Interlibrary Loan Clerk

My name is Susie Thomas. I am the clerk and interlibrary loan clerk at the Estill County Public Library. I have been at the library for 25 years. I love my job and enjoy coming to work each day. You might see me behind the circulation desk or cleaning a cartful of books that are ready for shelving. As the clerk I am responsible for recording and maintaining a weekly ledger of all transactions that we have taken in for copies, faxes and overdue fines. I also process all our new DVD's and audio books and get them ready for the shelf so that you may check them out. I do reader's advisory and prepare and mail our overdue notices.

What is interlibrary loan you might ask . . . ? If you are interested in a book that is not in our collection, we can borrow that book from another library for you. The process is very simple, just give the

person at the circulation desk the title of the book, the author, and any other information that you might know and that request comes to my desk, where at my computer I go into a program called OCLC Worldshare, where I can type in the information that was given to me. The book needs to be at least 1 year old, we can borrow 3 books for you at a time, and you must have a valid library card and be in good standing with the library. We cannot guarantee how long it will take to receive your book, as it depends on where the book is in the lending libraries system. When I find the correct title matching the information that was given to me, I can choose from 5 different libraries that has the book, some of the libraries are out of state, but I always try to pick the libraries that are in state and are reasonably closest to us. That request is sent and depending where it is in the borrowing libraries system, depends on how long it takes for us to receive the book. Our courier comes on Tuesday mornings, and the book is processed into our system, the book is then checked out to you and you are notified that your book is ready for you. The book checks out for 2 weeks, sometimes it can be renewed, depending on the own-

ing library. When you are finished with your book, simply return it to the library, and I take care of returning it to its correct home.

Remember if you have books that are ready to be returned to our library, we have books drops located at our Broadway location, in front of Bryant's Paint Store in Ravenna and in front of Honchell's in the West Irvine Plaza.

We are offering both limited in person services and curb services. On Mondays, Tuesdays, and Thursdays our hours are 9-11, 12-3, and 4-7, with sanitizing breaks from 11-12, 3-4 and 7-8. We do mostly curb services on Wednesdays and Fridays from 9-5 and Saturdays are 10-5.

Also remember that on Saturday April 17, 2021 we will be doing our first blood drive from 8 a.m.-1 p.m. in our Citizens Guaranty Bank community room. You will need to pre-register by calling 1-800-775-2522, or you can follow the link on our Facebook page to make an appointment and be sure to bring your photo I.D.

We miss seeing all of our patrons and look forward to when we can return to normal operations.



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WORKING ON AN OUTDOOR PROJECT?

By taking these important steps BEFORE you break ground - you can help protect not only yourself but our community. Disrupting an underground utility line can interrupt service, cause injuries, and cost money to repair.

-- Always call 8-1-1 first and know what's below --



1. NOTIFY

Call 8-1-1 or make a request online two to three days before your work begins. The operator will notify the utilities affected by your project.

2. WAIT

Wait two to three days for affected utilities to respond to your request. They will send a locator to mark any underground utility lines.

3. CONFIRM

Confirm that all affected utilities have responded to your request by comparing the marks to the list of utilities the 8-1-1 call center notified.

WARNING

4. RESPECT

Respect the markers provided by the affected utilities. The markers are your guide for the duration of your project.

5. DIG CAREFULLY

If you can't avoid digging near the markers (within 18-24 inches on all sides, depending on state laws), consider moving your project location.
