## Fresh funding is available through **Senior Farmer's Nutrition Program**

As the summer months in Kentucky tion Assistance Program (SNAP) is a fast approach, fresh funding is avail- federally funded food assistance proable for the Senior Farmer's Nutrition Program. This wonderful program provides low-income seniors with vouchers to use at your local farmers' market. Eligible individuals can receive assistance to buy fresh fruits and vegetables at their local market, all the while supporting local farmers.

Additionally, last year the USDA approved a program called the Pandemic-EBT, or P-EBT. This program allows families of Kentucky students to receive money to buy groceries to replace meals missed at school due to remote learning. This benefit is available to any Kentucky student that receives free lunches at school through the National School Lunch Program. Many grandparents who are raising their grandkids may qualify for this important benefit. Additionally, there are certain schools in Kentucky where every student receives the benefit. You can call your SHIP Counselor to see if you or a loved one might qualify.

Furthermore, did you know that on average a Kentucky SNAP participant receives about \$105 in food assistance each month? The Supplemental Nutri- lablaw.org/benefits-enrollment-center

gram that provides vital nutritional support to people all across the United States. Many people do not apply for SNAP benefits because they think they are not eligible, or because they assume they will only be approved for the minimum benefit of \$16 per month. However, most Kentuckians are approved for much more than the minimum benefit amount. Even if you have been denied these benefits before, or if you lost your support for one reason or another, you should contact your local SHIP program to see if you or your loved ones qualify for this valuable program.

If you have questions about your benefits, contact the Medicare SHIP. Your local Medicare SHIP Program is funded to provide accurate, unbiased information and to help you connect with money-saving benefits that many on Medicare are entitled to receive.
