Hello Estill County!

It's been a month since my last article, my how time flies. I have been very busy as usual, but for those of you who know me really well, know that I like to stay busy. On Mondays I start the process of pulling books, checking them out and bagging them up, for the home deliveries that I make on Wednesdays. When the deliveries are delivered, the returns are brought back to the library, checked in, cleaned and sanitized, and put into quarantine for 7 days, and then put back on the shelves. We receive many new books each month, and I try to process them in a timely manner, so I can get them to patrons as quick as possible.

I know there are folks out there who might be curious about the process of getting books on the shelves. I would like to explain the process of how we get our books, and what happens to them before they make it to our shelves.

The process starts with staff members looking through several book catalogs that contain current titles and reviews of the books. We automatically receive bestsellers which are very popular among our patrons. Once the books are selected from various catalogs, the ordering process takes place. When the books arrive a short time later, they are unpacked, and then passed on to staff members for cataloging. The cataloging of books and other materials consists of entering information about the item into our database. Each item has its own bibliographic record, which includes

all the information about the item. Spine labels with call numbers are also created, and printed by the cataloger. Once the catalogers are finished with the items, they are passed on to me, for the final steps of processing, and getting them on the shelf in a timely manner. I would just like to say that besides my Bookmobile position being my favorite, processing is definitely my second favorite job!

The processing begins with writing the month and year the book is received inside the front cover, usually on the title page; our property stamp is also put on this page. Call number spine labels are applied at this time, along with theft protection magnetic strips. Clear book jackets are put on hardcover books to protect the paper covers, this keeps them looking nice. Paperback books receive a sticky mylar laminate as their cover, this also protects the book, and keeps them looking nice and it also gives them a longer shelf life. Books are checked in at this time, and shelved in our new book section. When the book is checked in, if it has been put on reserve by a patron, we receive a message telling us who reserved the item and at this point instead of going to the new book shelf, the patron who reserved the item is called and notified that their reserve is ready for pickup. I think everyone who reads my article, will be surprised at just how many steps there are to getting a book onto our shelves; It is much more than taking them out of the box and putting them on the shelf.

As of May 13th Estill County moved back into the RED ZONE! The library must follow certain guidelines in order to be able to operate. We will offer curbside only while in the red zone. All services will still be offered, but no in person service.

Our Pickin' in the Park concerts have resumed on Tuesday nights, and can be viewed on Facebook Live from 6:30-7:30 p.m. Our special guest on

May 25th will be Grayson Jenkins.

The rest of my article will consist of what our library has to offer, and our newest resources, that maybe not everyone knows about. We offer many resources that are free; a library card is all you need to access any of them. You can access these resources from our home page at estillpublib.org, and I strongly encourage giving it a try, I guarantee you will be glad you did!

I would like to tell you about some of our resources, which include, laptops and hotspots for public use, free WiFi 8:00 am-10:00 pm 7 days a week, copies, faxes, notary services, Interlibrary loans, computer classes, resume help, and county-wide bookmobile service. We offer Virtual Storytime Wednesdays at 10:30, and Thursdays at 7:00 pm. Our Storytime can be viewed on Facebook Live. I would like to encourage everyone to visit our homepage at estillpublib.org to checkout our newest resources these include, Newsmax, Heritage Hub, and Flipster, plus much more. All of these are free and accessible by simply using your library card number. If you don't have a card, just come by the library with photo ID and current piece of mail and after paperwork, you will be issued a card, it is so easy, and you will have access to so many amazing resources. I also wanted to mention apps that can be downloaded onto your device which will allow you access to E-Books, these include, Overdrive, Libby, and Librista. We also have a very useful App which is PrinterOn.com. With this App you can print from home or anywhere and you can send the print job directly to the library and pick it up the same day, at your convenience.
