According to Tipton the neighbor owns his own business and is continuously bringing garbage and debris to the property and disposing of it. He said that the man has a fence around his yard so he can't see the garbage, but all

Tipton said that rats are coming from the area and that the man also has chickens and roosters running loose all over the place.

Another issue that Tipton said should concern the city is the fact that residents of the home have been dumping human waste over the fence behind their house

which is very close to the water treatment plant.. He concluded by saying that they have also closed the alley in that area, and that it's really getting old.

Mayor James Gross said that he was aware of the problem, and that he had sent the street workers over there once already to clean it up. He said he would send Sgt. Sam Hensley and Calvin Plowman over to the home on Tuesday morning to issue a citation and clean the mess up.
