BBQ Joints

What's your favorite barbecue joint? Southerners may not agree on which restaurant serves the best cue, but we are very passionate in our opinions. The South has many barbecue restaurants.

In my opinion, the Que Restaurant on River Drive in Irvine is my #1 choice for the best barbecue around. Previously, I would have said The Feed Store on Shelbyville Road just outside Louisville was my favorite que place. But honestly the Que is better.

Actually, we have been going to The Feed Store since Tara was playing softball in high school. The restaurant was just up the road from the softball field, and we went there several times to eat during the Mercy Softball tournament many years ago. It had remained my favorite until I started eating at the Que.

On vacation, we like to find favorite BBQ places to eat. These are some famous ones in different states. In Alabama: Dreamland, Ar-

kansas: McClard's, Florida: 4 Rivers Smokehouse, Georgia: Southern

According to Southern Living Magazine, Southern Soul Barbeque at St. Simons Island, Georgia was voted #1 in last year's voting. They are noted for their Georgia style pulled pork, tangy ribs and smoked chicken wings cooked on hardwood fired pits. It's a laid back coastal vibe.

#2 is Lexington Barbeque in Lexington, North Carolina. They have been cooking Piedmont NC pork shoulders over hickory in closed brick pits since 1962. North Carolina people used vinegar in their barbeque.

#3 is 4 Rivers Smokehouse in Winter Park, Florida. They slow cook smoked briskets to a Memphis Style pulled pork. They have grown from a single restaurant into a barbeque empire with 14 locations now.

#4 is Dreamland Bar-B-Que in Tuscaloosa, Alabama. "Big Daddy," prepares his smoked ribs and pulled pork and serves it with white bread and orange sauce. The restaurant was started in 1958 by John 'Big Daddy' Bishop.

#5 Mac's Barbeque in Skiatook, Oklahoma. Their barbeque is pork and ribs smoked with hickory wood on Old Hickory Pits. Founded in 1985 by Millian and Adam Green carries on the smoked BBQ tradition today.

So that rounds out the top five. I suppose no one knows how many BBQ Joints across America; the owners/mangers declare that theirs is the best.

We went to Navarra Beach Florida last week and visited some of these BBQ Joints. But nothing to write home about. Their specialty is sea food and it was good. Wouldn't be fun to eat at all of them! All in all, it's a worthy bucket list for any Southern barbeque.

POWER TOOL SAFETY IS IN YOUR HANDS

Electric power tools can take a small project and turn it into a big problem if the right safety measures aren't taken

7 steps to staying safe while using electric power tools:

- 1 Keep floors dry and clean to avoid slipping while working with or around dangerous power tools.
- 2 Ensure cords aren't a tripping hazard.
- 3 Examine tools and cords for damage before use.
- 4 Do not exceed the design limitation of the tool.
- 5 Do not use electric tools in wet conditions unless they are approved for that use.
- 6 Use double-insulated tools or tools with cords that are three-pronged and plugged into a grounded receptacle.
- 7 Use a ground fault circuit interrupter (GFCI) or an assured grounding program.
