

Estill Countian and Cousin Named to Ky. Music Hall of Fame

An Estill Countian and his cousin were recently named to the 2015 Kentucky Music Hall of Fame, based in Renfro Valley, Kentucky.

Brian Littrell and Kevin Richardson are leading members of one of the best-selling vocal groups in the history of the music industry. Their group, The Backstreet Boys, have sold over 130 million albums to date, and are one of only two groups ever, to see their release of seven consecutive albums reach the top 10 of the Billboard's Top 200. Multiple awards, sold out concerts and millions of albums sold have made these two young men from Kentucky, international music superstars!

Cousins Brian and Kevin grew up in Central Kentucky and sang together in local church choirs and festivals; the two formed a strong bond and a lasting friendship at a young age.

Brian Thomas Littrell was born in Lexington, Kentucky on February 20, 1975. He began singing publicly at Porter Memorial Baptist Church in Lexington and attended Tates Creek High School.

Kevin Scott Richardson is the youngest of three brothers and was born October 3, 1971, also in Lexington. His family moved to Irvine, Kentucky where Kevin played football and began performing in school plays. He graduated from Estill County High School.

In 1990, Kevin moved to Orlando, Florida and worked as the cast member "Aladdin" at Walt Disney World. While there, Richardson answered an ad in the Orlando Sentinel, auditioned and was selected to be a part of a new area boy-band. In need of an additional singer to fill out the group, Kevin encouraged a call to his cousin Brian in Kentucky for an audition. Brian was a junior in high school at the time and was called out of a math class when the offer to join the band was made. The next day Brian flew to Orlando and the group The Backstreet Boys was formed.

On May 8, 1993 at Sea World Orlando, Brian, Kevin, A.J. McLean, Howie Dorough and Nick Carter performed as members of the Backstreet Boys for the first time. Over the next year and a half the band traveled across the country playing in shopping malls, restaurants and at local high schools. In 1995, the band flew to Sweden and recorded "We've Got It Goin' On." It was the group's first single release and the pop tune soon entered the top 5 on the charts in Germany, Switzerland, Austria, France and the Netherlands. With the international release of their first album, self-titled, "Backstreet Boys," the band enjoyed success abroad and was voted the top group in Germany in 1996. Then, in May of 1997, "Quit Playin' Games With My Heart," was released in the states and climbed the charts

to the number two position on the Billboard Hot 100.

Their first album release in the states, also titled, "Backstreet Boys," included songs from their first international release as well as their second album release, "Backstreet's Back." The album rose to number 4 on the U.S. album charts and eventually sold over 14 million copies!

In 1998, The Backstreet Boys were recognized with numerous awards, including The 1998 Group Album of the Year at the Billboard Awards, People's Choice Favorite International Group Award at the Much Music Video Awards, Best Group Video at the MTV Video Music Awards and World's Best-Selling Dance Artist at the World Music Awards.

The single, "I Want It That Way," was the first release of the Backstreet Boys third album, Millennium. This single rose to number 1 in over twenty-five countries worldwide. When Millennium was released on May 18, 1999, it entered the Billboard Top 200 at #1 and set a record for first-week sales in the U.S. with over 1.1 million copies sold! Millennium became the best selling album of 1999 and while on the Millennium tour, the boys packed the Atlanta Georgia Dome with more than 85,000 adoring fans; a record crowd that remains the largest crowd ever to attend a concert by a pop artist group! More awards followed - 1999 Billboard Music Awards Artist of the Year, Album of the Year, Album Artist of the Year and Album Artist Duo/Group of the Year, Favorite Pop/Rock Band, Duo or Group at the American Music awards and still, in 1999, the group received their first Grammy nomination for Best New Artist.

Personal milestones occurred during this time as well - Brian proposed on Christmas Eve in 1999 to Leighanne Wallace and the couple was married September 2, 2000 at Peachtree Christian Church in Atlanta, Georgia.

Kevin announced his engagement to Kristin Kay Willits on MTV in February of 2000 and they were married June 17 at Lee County's Cathedral Domain, that same year.

In November of 2000, the string of success continued when the Backstreet Boys released the group's fourth album, "Black and Blue"- the album broke the previous record set by the Backstreet Boys by selling over 1.6 million copies in its first week of sales, making the Backstreet Boys and the Beatles the only two groups in history to have back-to-back albums sale over 1 million copies in the first week of their releases.

Through 2006, The Backstreet Boys continued to tour the world and promote albums as tens of thousands of fans filled stadiums in Stockholm, Tokyo, Sydney,

Cape Town, Rio de Janeiro and New York City. The Band accumulated multiple distinguished music awards during this period. Their world-wide popularity led the NFL to bestow the honor on the group to perform the National Anthem at Super Bowl XXXV in Tampa, Florida.

In late 2006, Kevin announced he was leaving the band to pursue other career interests. During his time away from the band Kevin enjoyed success as an actor, a model and composed the soundtrack for a feature animated film. During this time the Backstreet Boys continued to produce albums and tour the world - Brian also stepped out on his own to produce the solo Christian album, "Welcome Home;" it rose to number three on the Christian charts.

Kevin officially returned to the Backstreet Boys during a show in London on April 29, 2012. The band continues to work on a number of projects including their recently released documentary movie, "Backstreet Boys: Show 'Em What You're Made Of."

With their pure vocal harmonies, Kevin and Brian, as members of the Backstreet Boys, have established themselves as one

of the most successful vocal group bands in history; they have performed in front of Kings and Queens, The President of the United States, sang the National Anthem at the Super Bowl, enjoyed record attendance at their concerts all over the world and smashed records for albums sold. They have been honored with a star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame and are positioned for continued success with exciting new projects on the way.

Kevin Richardson and Brian Littrell have truly made an everlasting, permanent mark on the history of the entire music industry!

The Kentucky Music Hall of Fame honors Kentucky performers, songwriters, publishers, promoters, managers, broadcasters comedians and other music professionals who have made significant contributions to the music industry in Kentucky and around the world.

Also named to the 2015 Hall of Fame were Clarence Spalding, Doc Hopkins, Larry Cordle, Montgomery Gentry, The Moonglows, and Pete Stamper.

Native walleye stocked in Kentucky River; part of ambitious restoration project

Native walleye have returned to the Kentucky River after a decades-long absence.

Fisheries employees with the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources stocked more than 25,000 native southern strain walleye in the three forks of the Kentucky River above Lock and Dam 14 near Beattyville. The walleye, measuring 2-3 inches, went into the river last month.

"It's neat to think that maybe 50 years from now, we may have revived our native walleye populations," said Dave Dreves, assistant director over fisheries research at Kentucky Fish and

Wildlife. "One day, anglers might be catching a state record walleye. I think that's entirely possible."

Kentucky's current state record is a 21-pound, 8-ounce walleye caught by angler Abe Black out of Lake Cumberland in 1958. The world record walleye is a 25-pound fish caught in Tennessee's Old Hickory Lake in 1960.

Intense fishing pressure, poor water conditions, sedimentation and the flooding of spawning shoals as rivers were dammed combined to nearly wipe out the native walleyes. In their place, Kentucky Fish and Wildlife began stocking a northern

strain of walleye better suited for lakes.

The discovery of a remnant population of native walleye in 1995 triggered an effort to restore the natives throughout their former range. Since restocking began in 2002, native walleye have been stocked in the Rockcastle River, Wood Creek Lake, Barren River, Levisa Fork, the Cumberland River above Cumberland Falls,, Martins Fork Lake, Drakes Creek and this year, the Kentucky River.

Despite the difficulty of raising this strain of walleye, employees of the Minor Clark Fish Hatchery managed to produce 150,000

fingerlings from just three female broodfish this year. More broodfish could not be obtained from the wild due to heavy rains that made finding the egg-laden female walleyes difficult.

Once established, the southern strain of walleye tend to grow larger and faster than their northern counterparts. Researchers are optimistic that restoration of these native fish to their former range is possible.

"We're getting broodfish weighing 8 pounds out of the Barren River," Dreves noted. "We think water conditions have improved to the point where native walleye can make a comeback."

Bed bugs close jail

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Although the spraying was done Monday evening, Taylor said the jail and courthouse had to be aired out on Tuesday to get rid of the spray fumes.

The cleaning staff came in and opened the windows. The judge stated that he may even have the fire department to bring in large fans to aerate the courthouse so it can reopen on Wednesday.

Taylor said it is possible that bed bugs have been in the jail for at least six months. He was told by the brother of an inmate they were in the jail when his brother was there six months ago.

"We're always going to have this exposure to bed bugs," Taylor stated. "We'll probably have to go to a routine spraying by a professional."

There are some steps the jail may take to reduce the chances of bringing bed bugs inside.

All of the offices in the courthouse are open to the public. One never knows when a person may be transmitting bed bugs while doing their business there.

The Estill Tribune made several attempts to contact Jailer Bo Morris for this article. Because the jail was closed, our staff was unable to contact him.
