Chief Brad Smith went to 607 Cantrill Street to serve an arrest warrant on Brian Hall from the Kentucky Department of Corrections (DOC).

The DOC says that Hall, 44, has absconded his parole supervision and failed to report to the parole officer as directed.

Hall was found guilty of manufacturing methamphetamine, first offense, in Estill County. He was released to mandatory reentry supervision on February 1, 2016.


Smith said both women had failed to appear in court in the past.
