

Grand jury returns a dozen indictments

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The indictment also charges her with possession of drug paraphernalia and a controlled substance, third degree -- clonazepam. It says she had a cut straw with residue in her wallet, and she did not have a prescription for clonazepam.

Thomas' final charge in the indictment was the only felony. It charges her with wanton endangerment first degree. The indictment states that she had her child with her while she was driving her vehicle under the influence.

The arresting officer was Irvine Officer John Sturniolo.

Sky Green, 27, of Poplar Street, Ravenna was indicted for operating a motor vehicle under the influence of alcohol or drugs, possession of a controlled substance, first degree and first offense (oxycodone); no operator's or moped license; and drug parapherna-

lia. Green was pulled over on March 16, 2016 by Irvine Officer John Sturniolo. The indictment says that she had in her possession eight 7.5mg oxycodone pills and a black compact mirror with white powder residue on it.

Sherman D. Collins, 48, Stevens Avenue, Irvine, was indicted on a single charge of wanton endangerment, first degree.

The indictment says that he created a substantial danger of death or serious physical injury to Opal Collins by holding a knife to her throat on March 28, 2016.

An eleven count indictment was returned against Jeremy Barnes, 29, of Glory Street, Irvine.

Barnes was charged with reckless driving, speeding 26 mph or greater over speed limit, operating on suspended

or revoked license; fleeing or evading police first degree (motor vehicle), two counts of wanton endangerment first degree; two counts of wanton endangerment first degree - police officer; operating the motor vehicle under the influence of alcohol or drugs, resisting arrest, and possession of a controlled substance, first degree, first offense (suboxone).

The traffic offenses allegedly occurred on March 21, 2016. The indictment says that Barnes pulled out in front of a blue vehicle and almost rear ended a white one.

It adds that he also created a substantial danger of death or serious physical injury for Captain Adrian McKinney and Ravenna Chief Ken White.

Captain McKinney conducted the investigation.

Travis Cooper of Greenville, Ky. was indicted on a

single charge of theft by unlawful taking or disposition -- all others over \$500.

The indictment states that Cooper had a camper on April 29, 2016 that had been reported stolen by Wendy Harrison.

Deputy Russell "Doc" Morris was the investigating officer.

Brian Dixon, 51, of Kissey Branch Road, Irvine, was indicted for cultivating marijuana (five plants or over), trafficking in marijuana (8 ounces to five pounds), and possession of a handgun b a convicted felon.

Dixon was allegedly growing eight plants under grow lights on December 15, 2015 and had five bags of packaged marijuana with the intent to sell. The indictment says he possessed a Walther P38 handgun that day while he was a convicted felon.

Jeffrey C. Twist, 50, a

homeless man of Irvine, was indicted for trafficking in a controlled substance, first degree, first offense (methamphetamine), possession of a controlled substance, first degree, first offense (hydrocodone, LSD and suboxone), drug paraphernalia (a marijuana pipe, two syringes used to inject drugs, and a scale), illegal possession of a legend drug (gabapentin) and resisting arrest.

Twist was arrested March 4, 2016 by Officer John Sturniolo.

An indictment charges Jacquelin Bond, 36, of Red River Road, Irvine with false statement/misrepresentation to receive benefits over \$100.

The indictment states that between May 22, 2014 and October 20, 2015, Bond failed to report the correct household income while receiving benefits from SNAP (Supplemen-

tal Nutrition Assistance Program). The indictment says she received an overpayment of \$7,954.00.

Arin Damron, OIG Special Investigation, presented this case to the grand jury.

The grand jury indicted Brandon C. Rogers, 30, of Meadows Lane, Ravenna for theft by unlawful taking or disposition under \$500. This charge is a misdemeanor so Rogers' case will be remanded back to Estill District Court.

The indictment states that Rogers took tools and a safe on March 11, 2015 which belonged to Latisha Noe.

Deputy Morris was the investigating officer.

The grand jury reports there insufficient votes to return an indictment against Matthew Canter. The case was brought to the jury by David Marcum, Criminal Justice Training Investigator

Two more are charged in connection with accidental shooting on May 11

Two more people have been charged with falsely reporting an incident after an accidental shooting on Stacy Lane, May 11.

One of the victims, Timothy Stanley, 24, of Stacy Lane, was arrested on a warrant May 16 by KSP Troopr Z. Pennington for falsely reporting an incident, possession of a handgun by convicted felon, and possession of a defaced firearm.

The warrant was obtained by Det. Jesse Armstrong, who reported to Stanley's residence to investigate a drive-by shooting.

Police say they were told that a white Chevrolet pickup had driven by and shot Stanley and Stacy Dailey. Det. Armstrong said the evidence at the scene did not match up.

Stanley was transported to the UK Medical Center. He was interviewed at the hospital by Det. Tye Chavies. He reportedly told Det. Chavies that he was shot in a drive-by shooting. The citation says later that Stanley admitted to Det. Chavies that he accidentally shot himself and Ms. Dailey.

Two guns were found in a woodpile at the residence. One of the guns was a 9 mm with the fired casing in the gun. The other was a High-

point 45 caliber with the serial number filed off.

Stanley was charged with falsely reporting an incident, possession of handgun by convicted felon, and possession of a defaced firearm.

Patricia Stanley, 45, also of the same address at Stacy Lane, was arrested on a warrant the same day. She was charged with tampering with physical evidence and falsely reporting an incident.

The warrant says she also told police that it was a drive-by shooting. She reportedly took a bloody blanket from the living room and hid it in the bedroom closet.

The two Stanleys were arraigned last Wednesday in Estill District Court. They pleaded not guilty to the charges.

They are scheduled to appear back in court on May 23 for preliminary hearings.

Falsely reporting an incident is a misdemeanor, but each of the four people are also facing other charges, which are felonies.

Melissa Marie Townsend and Frank J. Dailey were arrested for falsely reporting an incident a day after the shooting. Frank Dailey gave a Somerset address.
