During the search, the chief says that IPD located several bags of Schedule The officers located 2 narcotics, including hydrocodone, amphetamine, and methulphenidate. The Schedule 4 narcotics included norazolam and clonazepam in two different types.

> The citations state along with the packaged pills were drug paraphernalia including scales and pipes. Heroin was field tested, and Smith said that test was positive.

The two occupants were then charged with trafficking in a controlled substance, first degree and first offense (Heroin), trafficking in a controlled substance, first degree and first offense (over 10 dosage units), and trafficking in a controlled substance, third degree.
