## ESTILL COUNTY'S CEDAR GROVE - A Kentucky Community and Its People

The following is the tenth in a series of articles about the community of Cedar Grove and the west-central part of Estill County that have been compiled by Jerry G. Rose and are from information included in his book, "ESTILL COUNTY'S CEDAR GROVE - A Kentucky Community and Its People"

#### by JERRY G. ROSE Cedar Grove Methodist Church - Part 1 **Very Early Years**

Perhaps no institution identifies more with the community of Cedar Grove and has lasted the longest as has the Cedar Grove (United) Methodist Church. The church was built about 1881 on land deeded by James and Ann (Finney) Wilcox. The church was nestled on a ridge of virgin cedar trees. Mr. Wilcox and some dedicated friends built the church. The sills were hand hewn from trees surrounding the area and the interior plaster was mixed with hog hair to bond the plaster. The original pews were made from poplar wood.



James Franklin Wilcox arrived in Cedar Grove in the mid-1800s. He purchased considerable land in what would become the Community. He deeded the land for the establishment of the Methodist Church.



The original building faced the old KY 52. It was just a plain building with wood stoves and men's and women's toilets located behind the building. Later the building was turned sideways and moved backwards to make space for a new sanctuary.

The following Article and Poem were written by Mary (Wilcox) Cain and Gladys (White) Stewart describing the early history of the church.

#### A Church is Born By Mary Cain

Many things, worth remembering, are lost from history because someone failed to pass it on by written word or words of mouth.

Let's do a little reminiscing that might be interesting to some people. Some of our young folk may not know that old highway 52, many years ago, was called a turnpike and that it was the stagecoach line between

Richmond and Beattyville through Irvine. We must remember, the road was not smooth and hard as it is today, but more or less rough and rocky, and pulling a coach loaded with passengers and baggage was hard work for the team to pull up a steep rough hill. So, ever so far apart, there were stables where the tired team horses were relieved and fed and a fresh team hooked to the coach

Our uncle used to tell how the driver of the coach, when he reached the top of Rice Station hill, would give the signal, by blowing a horn and anyone wanting to ride the coach would be out by the roadside.

These horns were made by hand from the horn off the head of some farmer's herd of cattle. And, they cold be heard for miles.

About three miles west of Irvine, on the north side of the turnpike, and about halfway to the Kentucky River, a ridge runs parallel with the river. This ridge and the area to the turnpike was covered with large virgin timber, so much of the timber was cedars, they gave to this place its name, Cedar Grove.

This James Wilcox owned the land between the turnpike and the river, and the unique thing about him was, he had the fore-sight and good judgment to realize the community needed a church. He therefore proceeded to stake off a plot of ground, bordering the turnpike, and set about with some free help to erect a building. It was slow, for with no modern tools, even the sills had to be hewn by hand after the trees were cut. These were the days when hog hair was mixed with the plaster to make it hold together.
