## Irvine couple jailed in Paris on Monday

An Irvine woman was arrested October 16 by the Paris Police Department on a warrant obtained by Irvine Police Chief Brad Smith.

The woman was identified as Shelleana Stone, 33, of West Chamberlain Branch, Irvine. She was lodged in the Bourbon County Detention Center.

The warrant states that on Sept. 9, Stone had a check in her possession which belonged to Tabitha Strange.

It adds that Stone deposited the check at Branch Banking and Trust and obtained \$150.00 from Strange.

The warrant charges Stone with theft by description including cold checks under \$500 and criminal possession of a forged instrument.

Bail for Stone was set at \$2,500 cash.

At her arraignment on Monday, Stone pleaded guilty to both charges in Estill District Court. A preliminary hearing is scheduled for October 18.

An Irvine man, Charlie Hamilton, was also arrested by Paris Police. He was arrested on a bench warrant and lodged in the Bourbon County Detention Center.

Taylor stated the fiscal court considered the liability of relocating a portion of the road in the power line right of way to reject that idea.

An off-road vehicle group which uses the road for recreation may donate gravel for the road.

Fire Chief Derrick Muncie updated the fiscal court on runs made by the county fire department. The department has made more than 40 runs more than this time last year.

Fall fire season is in effect through December which limits outdoor burning.

Muncie said the CSEPP exercise a few weeks ago went smoothly.

Davis stated his office has been getting a lot of calls from new property owners who did not receive tax bills. Any property owner who did not receive a bill can contact the PVA or sheriff's office.

## Indictments waived

Two more have waived indictments by the Estill County Grand on felony charges.

By waiving the indictments, the defendants will proceed in Estill Circuit Court with charges they believe will be made against them.

Patricia Meacacke will be sentenced for criminal mischief first degree and assault fourth degree, a misdemeanor.

The waiver states that Meacacke intentionally damaged property at 277 Broadway on Sept. 25. She also caused minor damage to a victim.

Josh Ledford waived an indictment on a charge of possession of a controlled substance, first degree.

The waiver states that on Sept. 24, Ledford had a baggie of methamphetamine in his possession.


