Closure scheduled for the Mountain Parkway/KY 9000 in Clark County

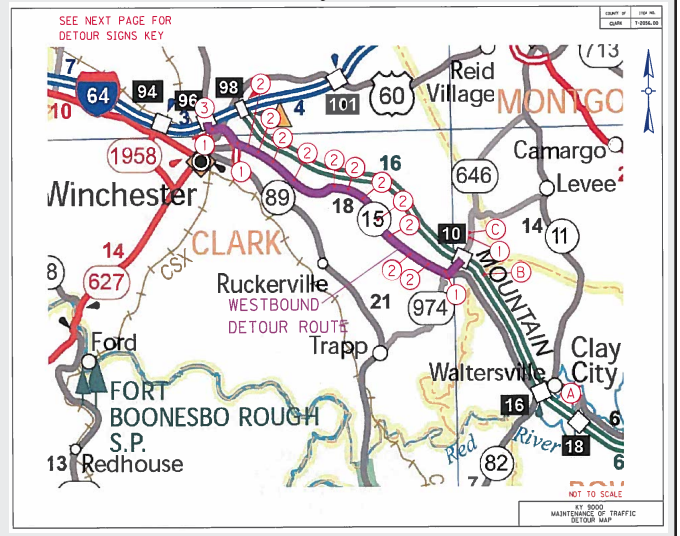
Part of the Mountain Parkway/KY 9000 rehabilitation project

The Kentucky Transportation Cabinet, Department of Highways, announces that a temporary closure is scheduled for the Mountain Parkway/KY 9000 in Clark County. The closure is necessary for deck restoration and waterproofing operations to be performed for the bridge over Interstate 64, 7:00 p.m., Friday, July 7 through 6:00 a.m., Monday, July 10.

- The westbound side of the Mountain Parkway (mp 0.00 to mp 5.311) will be closed at Exit 10)

- Westbound traffic will be diverted off of the parkway at Exit 10 onto KY 974 to KY 15 and KY 1958 to Winchester.

- See map below with the location of the detour.
- The closure may be extended if additional work is deemed necessary.



Biker faces 20 charges after fleeing on Friday

The citation states the bike operator refused to get out of the vehicle. It adds that he was physically removed from the truck.

According to the citation, the bike operator kicked one officer several times and Sgt. Sturniolo once.

The man was identified as Stevie LeMaster, 53, of 4th Street in Ravenna. LeMaster was taken to Marcum & Wallace Memorial Hospital where he refused a blood test. He reportedly had refused field sobriety tests at the scene.

The five-page citation states that LeMaster had sold methamphetamine to a confidential informant on an earlier date and \$1,488 was seized by the Irvine Police Department.

LeMaster was lodged in

the Three Forks Jail in Beatyville.

He was charged with fleeing and evading police first (vehicle); fleeing and evading police first (foot); unlawful imprisonment first; assault of a police officer third degree; leaving the scene of an accident; resisting arrest; tampering with physical evidence; wanton endangerment first; trafficking in a controlled substance, first degree/second offense; persistent felony offender; operating a motor vehicle under the influence; no registration plate; failure of non-owner to maintain insurance; failure to register transfer motor vehicle; license to be in possession; no motorcycle license; reckless driving; disregarding stop sign; unauthorized use of a motor vehicle; and failure to yield right of way.

Sizemore's citation says the surveillance video showed him in possession of a Dell laptop which was stolen from the road department.

Chief Smith said the laptop was valued at well over \$500.

Sizemore was charged with third degree burglary, but he was also charged with theft by unlawful taking over \$500 (the laptop).

Sizemore was incarcerated in the Bourbon County Detention Center. His bond has been set at \$10,000 cash.

Chief Smith said the lap-

top was recovered at 436 North Madison Avenue in Irvine.

According to a citation, Sizemore had traded the laptop to William J. Fox, 35, who lived at the address.

Fox was charged with receiving stolen property over \$500 but under \$10,000. He was transported to the Three Forks Regional Jail in Beatyville.

Bail information was unavailable for Arvin and Fox.

Smith was assisted in making the arrests by KSP Trooper Austin Brashear.

The case remains under investigation.
