Gross stated that city employees had been working hard to make sure that all garbage was picked up in a timely manner and that they were making several trips a day to the landfill using a truck and a trailer. He added that Advanced Disposal had come into the city one day last week and emptied the 36 dumpsters throughout the city.

The purchase of a new police cruiser was discussed, and the council agreed to go ahead and order the cruiser so it would arrive sometime in April.

Police Chief Brad Smith said that the city receives approximately \$70,000 per


year in fees from the sale of alcohol. He said part of that money is set aside for his salary and \$14,000 was approved by the council last year to give officers in the department a raise.

The new cruiser will be purchased from Freedom Dodge in the amount of \$25,600. Smith said the oldest car they have in their fleet is a 2006 but it still has a lot of life left in it. He said the newest cruisers purchased by the department are 2015, 2016, and 2018 models. All council members were in favor of the purchase.
