This week we will hunt with Brian Riddell. Brian is my neighbor and friend. Here is his story. Brian has been hunting for 32 years. He started hunting with his dad at the age of 9 years old. That is also the year he took his first deer. He took it with his dad's thirtyfive Marlin. They were hunting in Trimble County.

The big buck he took this year was somewhat a surprise: he never knew it was in the area. In other words, this is the way we did it before trail cams. He found the rubs, saw where he found signs, and went into the Daniel Boone National Forest, the old fashion way. He had scouted for his deer; he found three gi-

ant rubs and knew the big boy was there. He figured out where they were eating. He found an oak ridge and a place they were bedding. It was 'Game on.'

On the evening of November 5th, he got to his hunting ground somewhat late. Within 15 minutes, he heard two deer running behind him. It was a buck chasing a doe. When he turned to look at them, he was somewhat disappointed. It was an eight-pointer for sure, but not the buck that was making all the rubs.

They stayed just out of range, and dark was coming fast. He figured he just as well play some with the buck. His mind was set. He wasn't going to waste a tag on this buck when he knew a really big boy was in there. He snort wheezed and the buck looked up the hill at him. Again he snort wheezed; the buck followed suit. He was coming, but so was darkness.

Then to Brian's surprise, he heard, turning over to his left. He let out a soft whisper, 'Oh my God.' Walking stiff-legged, hair up on his body, licking his nose every step, he made the turn Brian needed, and let his bolt fly from his crossbow. Brian was using a red lighted tip and a Ten Point Titan crossbow, a top of the line setup.

Brian climbed down, called his brother to come and help. Brian was in a state of shock. His brother got there. They were over three hours getting the big deer to the truck well after dark. He field dressed 224 pounds, and measured 75/8 inches at the base. He has yet to be scored, but is a trophy in anybody's


Holiday Festivities
