Police Activity

- An Irvine man was charged with possession of methamphetamine while Ir-vine Chief Brad Smith was investigating a stolen com-puter.

Smith was on his way to Mt. Crest when dispatch notified him there was an active warrant for the arrest of **Jonathan Walling**, 35, of Mt. Crest.

Walling was located in a breezeway at Mt. Crest. Chief Smith said he was cuffing Walling, when Wall-ing told him that he had a small amount of metham-phetamine in is front pocket.

Walling was then charged with possession of meth, which is a felony.

The bench warrant was from Grayson County Dis-trict Court, where Walling had allegedly failed to ap-pear for a court date on a charge of operating a motor vehicle under the influence.

The Grayson County District Judge set a bail of \$300.00 cash for Walling.

No other information was given on the stolen comput-er.

- An 18 year old home-less man was arrested early Thursday morning on traf-fic offenses by Officer Jason Conrad.

The citation states that Officer Conrad observed a 2002 Toyota Sequoia driv-ing north on Main Street at 12:08 a.m. with only one headlight illuminated.

The driver told the officer that he did not have a driv-er’s license. The officer ran the driver’s name and birth-date with Kentucky State Police who advised there was a warrant for the man’s arrest. (At the time the war-rant was issued, the man had not turned 18.)

Conrad said he located a small baggie of marijuana in the vehicle and a digital scale under the driver seat.

The man was searched at the jail by transport offi-cer who reported he found a small baggie containing four green pills. The pills were identified as Diazepam, a schedule 4 narcotic.

Darold Gene Patton Jr. was charged with one head-light, no operator’s - moped license, possession of mari-juana, drug paraphernalia - buy/possess, and possession of a controlled substance, third degree.

Patton was arraigned in Estill District Court on Feb-ruary 8. He pleaded not-guilty to the charges. He is scheduled to return to court on February 13 for a pre-trial conference.

Patton’s bond was modi-fied to him being released on

his own recognizance.

- Deputy Russell Morris arrested **James Leon Covey**, 46, of Betsy Ridge Road, Ravenna on February 4.

Morris charged Covey with wanton endangerment in the first degree.

The citation states that Covey tried to run over his brother, John.

Covey’s wife witnessed the event. Morris was also told the accused had been drinking alcohol.

Covey admitted to the deputy and Kentucky State Police that he had tried to run over his brother.]

Covey pled not-guilty during his arraignment on February 6 in Estill District Court. He is scheduled to return for a preliminary hearing on Feb-ruary 13.

- An Erlanger man was ar-rested February 1 in Grant County on a warrant dating back to 2016 from Estill County.

Capt. John Sturniolo had obtained the warrant for **Hank Campbell**, 32, who was then living on High Street, in Irvine.

The warrant charges Campbell with trafficking in a controlled substance, sec-ond degree.

It states that on July 9, 2016, Campbell bought a suboxone pill for \$25.00 at a residence on Broadway.

Campbell allegedly re-sold the pill to a confidential informant working for the Irvine Police Department.

He was arraigned Feb-ruary 6 in Estill District Court where he pled not-guilty. Campbell’s preliminary hearing is set for February 13.

Bail was set at \$7,500 cash.

The citation from Grant County states that Campbell was traffic-stopped on I-75 for speeding.

He said that the animal shelter took in 225 more cats last year than in previ-ous years and it’s become a big problem. The cats that are caught and released back into the community would still be beneficial in catch-ing mice and other rodents. Without the grant money the shelter would not be able to provide that service.

During the discussion of the financial report Coun-cilman William Van Cleve questioned why Larry Stew-art’s name was still on the Charlie Van Huss account. Van Cleve stated that Stewart was administrator over the Van Huss estate but that duty was completed in 2015.

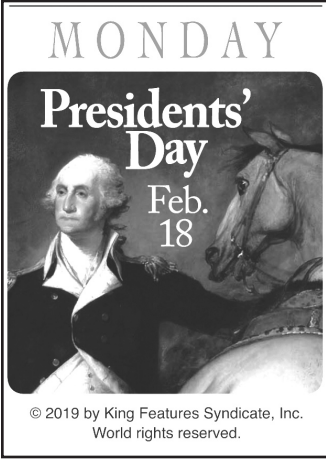
Van Cleve went on to say that Stewart received a big payoff for handling the estate and there was no need for him to still be on the account and he felt like his name should be removed from it.

Councilwoman Valerie Flinchum agreed and said that when she was out cam-paigning that nine out of 10 people wanted to know why there was a committee over that money instead of al-lowing the council to decide what it was spent on.

Mayor Estine Tipton stat-ed that it was the way that it was set up and that she would have to speak to the lawyer if the council want-ed it changed. She said that Charlie Van Huss wanted the money that he left for the city designated for projects and that his dream was to see the park fixed up.

Mayor Tipton said that she has a meeting on Feb-

ruary 25th to possibly hire Beverly Brewer as the city’s attorney and she would dis-cuss the matter with her at that time and let the council know what could be done about the account.
