### Women arrested on drug charges

An Estill County female was arrested January 30 by Capt. John Sturniolo for trafficking in methamphet-

The citation states that on Tuesday, January 5, a confidential informant traveled to Bobby Miller Road, Irvine to buy methamphetamine.

It adds that informant purchased \$30 worth of a crystal substance from a female living at the residence. It was wrapped in white paper.

The female was identified as 30 year old Diane Estes. She was charged with trafficking in a controlled substance, first degree and first offense (methamphetamine).

Another woman was charged with possession of drugs the following day, January 31, in an unrelated incident.

Capt. Sturniolo was dispatched to the parking lot of the Estill County Courthouse at noontime to investigate a possibly intoxicated female.

He stated he came in contact with Pamela Childress, 49, of 8th Street in Ravenna. The citation states the woman had slurred speech and was unsteady on her feet.
