Estill County High School student Summer Evans put her business skills to work this summer at The Center for Rural Development's 2019 Entrepreneurial Lead-

ership Institute (ELI).

Evans was among 25 high school students from 19 Kentucky counties to attend ELI, a summer youth leadership program for aspiring student entrepreneurs, held July 22-26 at The Center in Somerset.

ELI is an intensive weeklong program focused on developing creativity, teamwork, and business and leadership skills. Students work together in business teams to develop a written business concept for a new business venture or product idea.

Shelton Ansley of Kentucky Highlands Investments Corp. taught the curriculum for this year's program and helped students prepare to present their business plans before a panel of judges at the ELI Business Concept Challenge Competition.

Evans, a member of the ELI business team, "The Start Up," pitched a business idea for a nonprofit organization that would provide struggling entrepreneurs with a low-cost storefront and access to experienced business mentors to help them get started with their business in Eastern Kentucky.

"This year's Entrepreneurial Leadership Institute (ELI) was an exceptional testament to the talents of our youth and the region's next generation of business leaders and entrepreneurs," said Lonnie Lawson, President and CEO of The Center for Rural Development. "We need bold, innovative ideas to grow the economy of Southern and Eastern Kentucky. It was encouraging to see these students come up with ideas to make our region more ecofriendly and address some of the challenges they see as

Estill Native Grace Berryman Celebrates 105th Birthday

Grace Berryman of Winchester, pictured above at age 100, formerly of Estill County, celebrated her 105th birthday with family and friends who dropped by her home on Sunday. She lives alone but receives regular visits from family members. Grace was born August 11, 1914 in Estill County, on Cressy Road, to George Jackson and Mae Shepherd Allen. According to the 1920 Census, she was the youngest of seven children, including Elmer 18, Ethel 15, Noomie 14, Linnie 12, Daisie 10, Willie 7, and Gracie 5. In 1930, only Grace and Willie are listed at home. Shopping in those days meant going to a store and post office at Iron Mound, a half mile away, that was operated by the Stone family. There were two schools in the community, each a half mile away, at Bonnie (near Iron Mound) and the Ivory Hill School, south of her home. Most students walked to school at that time. Grace's daughter, Freida Creech, said they were allowed to go to either school they chose. Grace married on December 23, 1931 to Sheridan Berryman. He passed away in 2006 at the age of 95. Grace's parents also both lived to relatively good ages. Her father died in 1954 at age 82, and her mother, known in the community as "Mammie Mae," passed away in 1972 at the age of 90.
